The important word he used was nation. A nation is not just one community it is all communities united together. He appeal to his readers by showing the circumstances he has been in and was treated awful. While in his jail cell he took the time to write a lengthy letter not many people would. But he took that time to share the unjust and how it can be fixed and all he wanted was to be treated the same as a white man. With this letter he led us closer and closer to freedom.

Dr. King letter is still a reflection on what is happening today. His letter was about being treating equally no matter race, background or financial status. Right now in this world that's all my community and I want is equality. An example is the loss of George Floyd this summer. He was wrongful profiled and killed just because of the color of his skin. If that was a white men that would have never happen. This limit me as a black young man to go places with fear that I can get arrest or

killed because of the color of my skin. Can I go to the store? Can I wear a hood? Can I walk down the street? No I probably cannot do this without being seen as a threat which I am not. Society try to paint African American out to be dangerous but we are human just like everyone else. The Letter from Birmingham shows how the nation was worse than today and we have come so far. This gives me faith that we will get through these rough times and will one day be seen as fully equal.

In conclusion, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. has made a huge impact on this country. With the words he left behind we will continue to improve and seek the justice we deserve. So many people have died trying to help build a better future for us. Dr. Kings legacy will continue.
